WEEK 4 — LOVE!

The Fourth Sunday of Advent: Love

"I choose the appointed time; it is I who judge uprightly." (Psalm 75:2)

The appearance of angels during the Nativity of Jesus is extraordinary. Let's chronicle this activity of angels:

The word *angel* (ἄγγελος or angelos) means messenger. As we have seen, angelic messengers are pivotal in the Nativity story. Everyone focuses on the appearance of the angels to the shepherds. The myriad of angels who join the initial messenger praising God is astonishing, unique in the nativity story. During the appearance to Mary and Zachariah, we learn the name of the angel Gabriel and a little about his duties and authority. We also know that angels are genderless beings although we'd never refer to one as "it."

The angel appearing to Joseph is often overlooked. The first message brought to Joseph stops him from making a decision which will be hard to walk back, and it encourages him to take steps for Mary's protection. We are told that Joseph is a righteous man and he acts the part. Joseph shows himself to be a regular guy, who works hard and is a person of trust.

Think about it, Mary and Joseph must go to his ancestral home in Judea to register. As we learned in the devotional for the second Sunday, *The Bethlehem Candle*, it is Bethlehem where messiah is to be born. Joseph is warned by the angel after the wise men leave to escape the rage of Herod by fleeing to Egypt. When Herod dies the family returns to Israel; the angel again helps Joseph locate a safe place to live. Joseph learns to depend upon the angel's direction and takes steps so that the family is preserved.

As Advent comes to a close, it is important, as Christ followers to remember what kind of people are we to be—as light in a dark place. The Holy Spirit is in us to help us live righteous lives as we anticipate Jesus' second coming. Peter tells us, "You ought to live holy and godly lives as you look forward to the day of God and speed its coming." (2 Peter 3:11-12; John 14:16-17)

Keep on loving each other as brothers. Do not forget to entertain strangers, for by so doing some people have entertained angels without knowing it. (Hebrews 13:1-2)

Without measure! Week 4, Monday

As Zachariah's son, John is to be circumcised on the eighth day. Many well-wishers assume that he will get a family name. Zachariah still can not talk but he confirms the name Elizabeth keeps trying to tell them by writing on paper, "His name is John." At that instant, "he began to speak:" After some glorious and extended praise he continues:"

And you, my child,
will be called a prophet of the Most High;
for you will go on before the Lord to prepare the way for him,
to give his people the knowledge of salvation through the
forgiveness of their sins,
because of the tender mercy of our God,
by which the rising sun will come to us from heaven
to shine on those living in darkness and in the shadow
of death,
to guide our feet into the path of peace."

Jesus comes after John and demonstrates the love of God "that surpasses knowledge." Paul speaks of this love as a mystery that is now revealed because of Jesus. Then Paul prays for us. "Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen."

(Ephesians 3) Wow! Amen!
